Call to order by President Dobie at 1pm with a thank you to Al and Dave for setting up the Sportsmen Club building so everyone could be spaced out. Thank you. There were 47 people in attendance. After the Pledge of Allegiance, Chaplin Ken Heinritz gave the opening prayer. Secretary John Secord read the minutes of the 2019 Fall Meeting since we had no Spring meeting and were accepted as read. John also gave the treasurers report. The beginning balance was 3,502.16 and ending balance was 3,986.83. Dave Volz, 1st VP, reported the Player of the Year (POY) is on the website now, and is updated so pitchers can see where they stand. Dave also maintains the group email and pushed pitchers to sign up for that email list.

Kevin Brekke, 2nd VP, gave a plug for Team World in 2021, to start thinking about helping. We had a good amount of people helping the last time, and it would be great to see that help again. Kevin also mentioned to remember the sanction league tournament next October for all those pitchers that pitch in a sanctioned league. It is a three-person tournament and you get to pitch others from different states at the National Hall of Fame building. Kevin also mentioned the upcoming world sites and tournament dates:

2021 – Winnemucca, Nevada July 19-31.

2022 – Lansing, Michigan

2023 – Monroe, La (was given to them because no World there this year)

2024 – bids by January 1, 2022

Sonia Cook, 3rd VP, reported on the Junior Scholarship Fund – Beginning balance was 11,871 and ending balance was 11,621.45 this fall. Current balance now is 12,670.45. Liabilities are now 4,200. She thanked all who donated prizes to the raffle and made monetary contributions this year.

Hall of Fame committee chairman Jeff Secord mentioned how the presentation at state is a special event and the one for Dave Forseth, and a group of Sandbagger pitchers were there to support him. I was great seeing them and catching up with them. He mentioned that the vote is just before the spring meeting and nominations are always welcome. To see current nominee's, you can go to whpahorseshoes.com and click the HOF link.

Dave Volz, regional director, said a big thank you to all tournament directors for all the hard work they do

tournament schedule for 2021. Dave also mentioned that he went to Kewaskum to sanction the 10 clay courts they have there that have not been used for years. They are planning on having a sanctioned tournament there in 2021 on May 22, and Ken Heinritz would be the tournament director. Dave also mentioned the new patches for 2021 will have a new design. There was also mentioned of a new online pitching group SHOP, where you need to pitch on sanctioned courts, started by Walter Ray Williams Jr. Dave also gave an update on how to use ESHOE and can update your sanctioned card for renewal. There is a user fee of 1.32. ESHOE will be updated with HSMaster, so they will be one, and can see percentages in ESHOE. It would be updated right away, which would be a good thing. This is not ready yet but is coming. Dave also mentioned that those who sent money in for this years World Tournament, that was canceled, need to contact Jim Kinney, NHPA secretary, to designate whether you want a refund, or apply to next year's world tournament.

State meeting continued from page 6 Paul Weise represented the Eau Claire club that will be hosting the State Tournament in 2021. He mentioned there will be no beer sales during the tournament. Bring your own. Like in years past, there will be a Buckshot run at the park in the morning, and Paul will let everyone know in advance what the times will be to enter and exit the park. The 4H Club again will be doing the food.

Jeff Secord, Tournament director of Team World, spoke on this tournament. Started in 1985. He has done a lot of research and has posted at the Beloit club some interesting stats on the pitchers. There have been 125 pitchers from Wisconsin compete in this tournament, and 605 different pitchers have pitched in this special tournament. He mentioned that in 2021, Juniors will be able to pitch with limitations. Jeff also introduced that Team World would go from 5 teams bracket finals to 7 teams bracket finals. This gives two more teams a chance to be champion.

Marketing and Publicity director Fred Lane mentioned 2021 sanctioned is available now for the end of 2020 and all of 2021. 2022 state tournament will be special with a lot of history of Wisconsin horseshoes for the 100th anniversary at state. He also plugged the NHPA Trading Cards coming that people can order now. There is a link on the NHPA website. They will be coming at the end of November, I know, I ordered all the sets available. Fred will be sending a group email to everyone on that list with a link to sign up for them.

Jeff Secord mentioned that Jeff Pagel went to the city council meeting and mentioned that he won the state men's championship, and that they might consider giving him a parade in his honor. This was mentioned in the local paper, and Jeff saw it. What a great way to promote horseshoes. It got people talking about horseshoes. Marketing.

Election of Officers – John Secord, Sonia Cook, and Dave Volz ran unopposed, and won another two-year term.

Bid for the 2022 State Tournament – Kevin Brekke made sure everyone signed in, and made sure everyone that was eligible had a ballot to vote. To be eligible, a voter needed to be a sanctioned member in 2019 and 2020. There were two clubs in the running, the Beloit Horseshoe club, and the Little Bulls Falls club. Kevin also opened the bid to the floor in case there was a bid from there. There was not. Randy Mitchell made the presentation, complete with a very well booklet with pictures of the proposed site, for the Little Bulls Falls club and Dan and Tammy Newkirk made the presentation for the Beloit Horseshoe Club. The vote was the Beloit Horseshoe club with 24 votes, and Little Bulls Falls club with 16 votes. The Beloit Horseshoe club will host our 2022 State Tournament, which is our 100th anniversary.

Dave Volz had a special drawing for Tournament directors – Mark Mauthe will have his 2021 membership paid for in appreciation for his work. Thank you all Tournament directors.

Pitcher of the Year Dave Volz

2021 Pitcher of the Year! Yes, that's right, the points started all over after the first of August to determine next year's POY. The Pitcher of the Year award is determined by the number of points accumulated in tournaments from August 1st through July 31st. There are 3 Divisions which are determined by pitcher averages as of August 1st 2020. Division A is 45% and over, Division B is 30% - 44.99% and Division C is below 30%. Pitchers receive 15 points for a 1st place finish, 10 points for a 2nd place finish and 5 points for a 3rd place finish in open WHPA sanctioned tournaments. Bonus points are awarded for attending the WHPA Spring and Fall meetings in the amount of 15 points each. Regional Directors Report By: Dave Volz

The 2021 tournament schedule is close to being completed and the new patches have been ordered. The winter schedule with tournaments through March is in this issue and the full 2021 schedule will be in the first issue of the new year. On the website, go to Tournaments/Calendar at the top of the home page and see the events month by month, if you click on an event you will see the event information as well as the directions to the courts.

There are a lot of changes taking place with membership, tournament and stat information. Most of you have probably seen the Eshoe icon on the website, as of the first of January there will no longer be Natstats, it will be completely taken over by Eshoe. All of the features of Natstats will be implemented into Eshoe. You can access it by clicking on the icon or go to https://www.nhpa-eshoe.com. There you can go to player search and enter any members name or sanction number. You will be able to renew memberships, print a sanction card and view the past calendar years detailed tournament results.

The latest feature is the Event Search, click on it and it will show all upcoming Nhpa sanction events throughout the United States. You have a choice of viewing Wisconsin only or any other charter that you wish. You can also enter a date range to search. There will be two icons in the first column, an information button which will give you all of the tournament information and a trophy cup which will give you the tournament results once they are reported. There is a Status column which will say scheduled, reported (if the results have been reported) and cancelled if the event had to be cancelled for some reason. The tournament schedules for all of the charters are currently being entered into the system by the Regional Directors

Starting the first of January, Tournament Directors will be sending their tournament results in directly through an updated HSMaster program. Once the results are sent, they will automatically show up on the results page and on the players statistics page. I will be contacting Tournament Directors when the updated HSMaster program is available and I will be reviewing it with them, it's just a matter of entering a token number and sending in the results. There will be procedures set up to send tournament results for those not using HSMaster but I highly recommend that all Tournament Directors start using HSMaster. There will be a Tournament Director video coming out soon and I will get that to the directors when it becomes available.

Jr Raffle / Director Report Sonia Cook

Our Junior Program is sitting pretty with our liabilities \$4,200 and Account Balance \$12,670. State Junior Boys and Girls Champions are awarded \$300; Second place winner receive \$150. These awards are kept in an account until the Junior shows proof of enrollment in a post secondary opportunity.

The 2020 Raffle was very successful thanks to the donations from Kevin Aarstad, Linda Roebver, Ricj Conrad, Mel & Sonia Cook, Tava Cook, Craig and Kari David, Dobie Gutweiler, Don Elgin family, Jane Smith, Lonny Trangasrud, Beloit Horseshoe Club, Deansville horseshoe club and the WHPA.

"The Cruel Shoes" by Justin Kern The Greatest Games That No One Else Saw,Vol. I: Pueblo 2003

Bleary eyed across the cusp of the boundless American West, I woke up to the site of horseshoes left in their pits, victoriously, with empty beer cans around much of the rest of the residential backyard.

The sun peeked in almost indigo from behind yet another mountain range to reveal this recreational scene, finished just a few hours before, when night fought off summertime dawn. Yet we could plainly see, in this yard of a home where near strangers had hosted us and more, the confirmation of the final act of the previous night's majesty: two of the greatest games of horseshoes in human history had, for certain, happened, here, in Pueblo, Colorado. Yet now all we could do was leave.

It was 2003 and I was in a some-time touring punk rock band. The five of us lived and went to school in Buffalo, N.Y. We were talented enough in a very specific genre of screaming and yelling music that people had us in their towns to play basements, clubs, bars, bowling alleys, art spaces, illegal lofts, and, one Halloween, a haunted psychiatric ward

That summer, we booked about five weeks of shows across thousands of miles, western New York to Madison, Denver to San Francisco, Los Angeles to Albuquerque, and, the cartographically challenged final stretch that included Little Rock, Columbus, western Massachusetts and New York City. What to expect? If history served, weirdoes with an affinity in musical styles but entire lifetimes apart, different, similar, in motion. That served for most every stop, including Pueblo, where none of us had been before. We played a sports bar to about 100 kids, a rousing success that almost tricked you into thinking that one could do this, each night, and it'd always be enough.

After the show, if the show wasn't in someone's home, there was a somewhat shy social game of asking if you could crash with someone, so as to save on the scant "band fund" (desperately earmarked for burritos and



beer). This night, the promoters, Barkley and Jim, made it clear – they wanted to have us over. It was a beautiful night and they had a huge horseshoe pit in their backyard. In the short drive to their place, the trash talking ramped up exponentially. In those minutes of driving, the horseshoes matches had grown with such chest-puffing that they were

now billed as The Transnational Punk Rock Horseshoe Championship of 2003. It was on. Different throwing styles were scrutinized. Steps and oversteps were watched closely. Mothers may have been disparaged. An



ideal excuse to sit outside near a fire with beer had become a clanking, tightly measured competition. One that was split, with myself and our drummer Steve taking the first game, then our bassist Eric and a vocalist Dave edged out of the second. (Kristen, our fifth member, was content to sip beer and rightly taunt us from the small peanut gallery of people who had joined us from the bar.)

In a journal, I notched the scores: 41-30 and 42-39. If you can figure out how we got those tallies, I'm all ears. (Yes, "Coors" is a valid and likely answer.) The final scores beg questions on what other rules were bent, made up, colloquial or forgotten. That we played, together, is part of this sport that remains so enchanting. Horseshoes provides us an easy entrance for an acquaintance, something basic to share with a stranger. Which is why, I suppose, that as fun as that show was to play and to watch people enjoying it – it was the actual reason we were in town – the memory that sticks with me is that backyard, bonding over horseshoes, with good friends for a night.

Not written in my journal but vaguely remembered was the actual end of the night, after the games settled down. A visit from the police, who had been up the street on another call but couldn't help but hear/see our hootin' 'n' hollerin' into the early hours. This was not the type of trouble strangers, such as we were, wanted with our Dodge Caravan with out-of-state plates and a sardine pack-job with musical equipment and belongings. The same went for Barkley, Jim and crew, who calmly said our night was coming to and end, wrapping up the party portion of our time in Pueblo.

I slept in the minivan that night – a rotation for protection of our items, though I felt no threat from our new friends and sworn horseshoe rivals. Night was quick, as a few hours later, we woke to an ugly early alarm to make it in time to the next show in Salt Lake City (at a tiki lounge with anecdotes best shared in person at the bar).

Such is life on the road, more on it than you'd like, particularly after such generosity and camaraderie from people I haven't heard from in the subsequent 17 years. In case you do, though, the next time you're in Pueblo, please tell Barkley and the gang that I said I want a rematch. First one to 42 can claim the rightful championship of all the Coors they can drink.
